

- Used as backdrop for images with instructor.



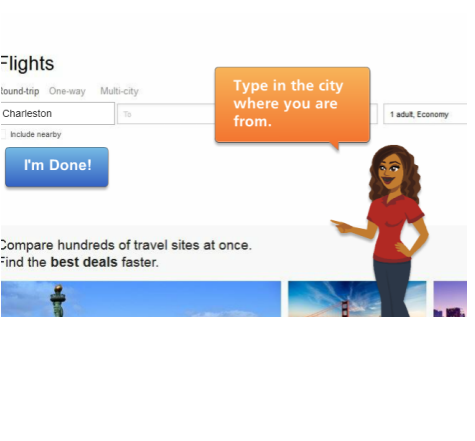
- Highlight box

- Orange rectangular outline
- Other colors or shapes may be used to provide high contrast to background



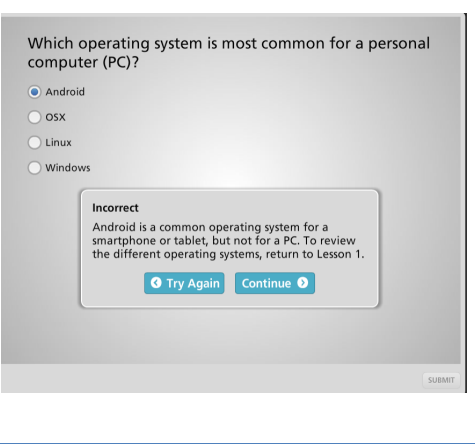
- Practice exercise example
- Provide clear instructions and hints



- Text box style examples
- Use color scheme
- Use high contrast between text and background color



- Interaction with instructor and “I’m Done” button
- Uses on-screen button mentioned in narration to “Submit” interaction



- Quiz feedback example
- Allow user to try again
- Give feedback to help them determine the correct answer
- Quizzes should reinforce and review course content

## the Internet

- Use Internet (with a capital “I”) when referring to the Internet

“Using a computer is not for me”



- Give user relatable stories based on user characters or personas



Tanya  
“I didn’t think I was smart enough”



Anita  
“I thought I was too old to learn something new”



Jack  
“I didn’t think I could afford it”



Della  
“I didn’t think it was safe”

- Give users choice in which order to view examples
- Here, user can click on each row to jump to that person’s story, visited state is shown at the top

## Publishing Notes

### Last Slide of Each Lesson:

Add this trigger to execute javascript when the timeline ends on each lesson (or when the user clicks the final “continue” or “finish course” button):

```
window.parent.sendLessonCompletedEvent();
```

### Publishing in Storyline 3:

1. Click “Publish”
2. Enter the title of the course (which may differ from your filename)
3. Add yourself as an author by clicking “...”
4. Select a destination to save the file, then click publish
5. Choose “ZIP”
6. Confirm the filename and click Save

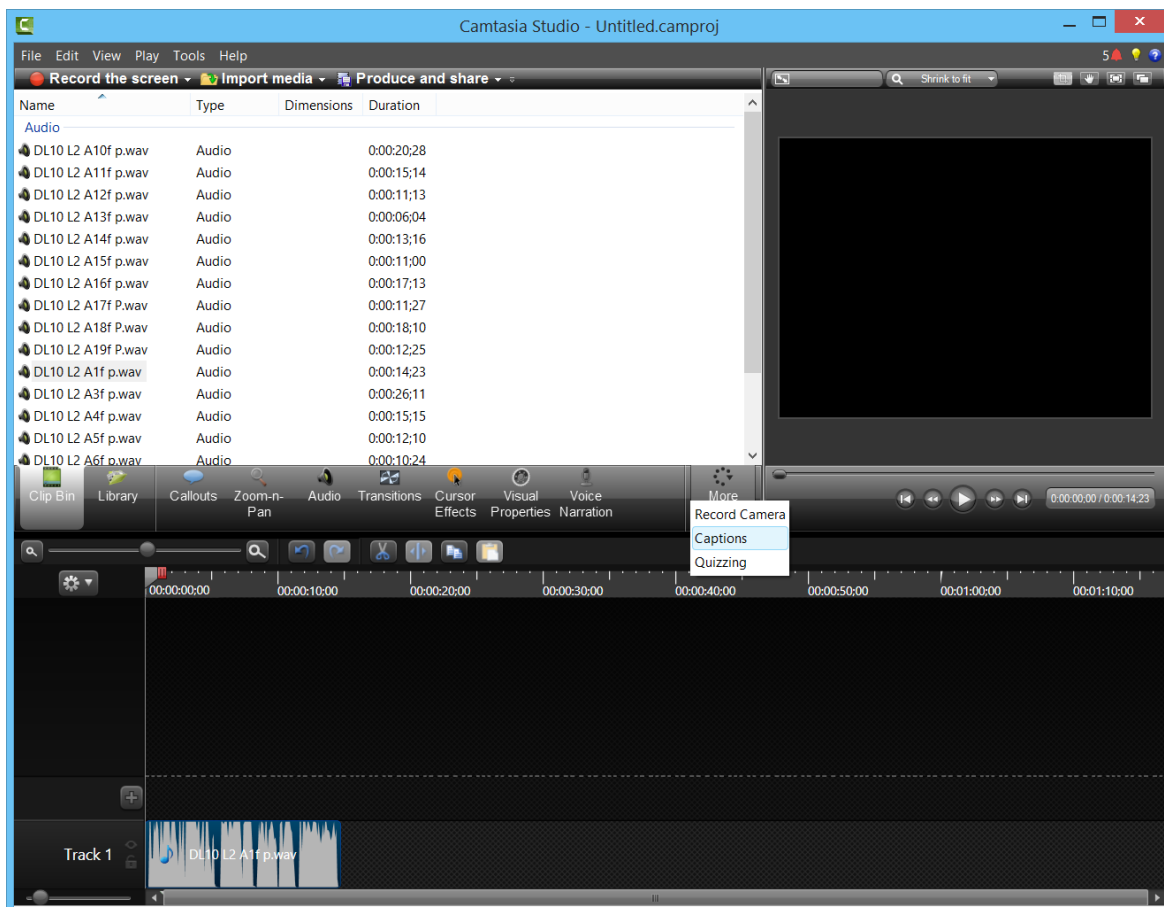
### Publishing in Storyline 2:

HTML5 Output checked, Articulate mobile player turned off

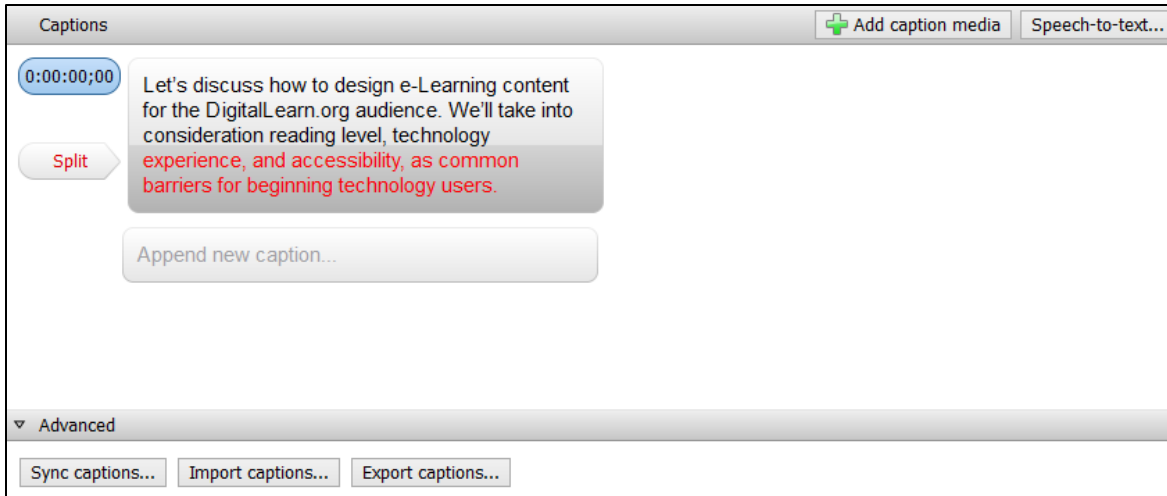
## Process for Adding Captions using Camtasia Studio

1. Open Camtasia
2. Click on Import Media. Select all audio tracks from the lesson and click Open.
3. **Generate the caption files (.srt)** by repeating this process for each slide:
  - a. Drag the audio file to the beginning of the Tracks area on the bottom half of the screen.
  - b. Open the Captions tab to the far right of the clip bin (you may have to click on “More”)

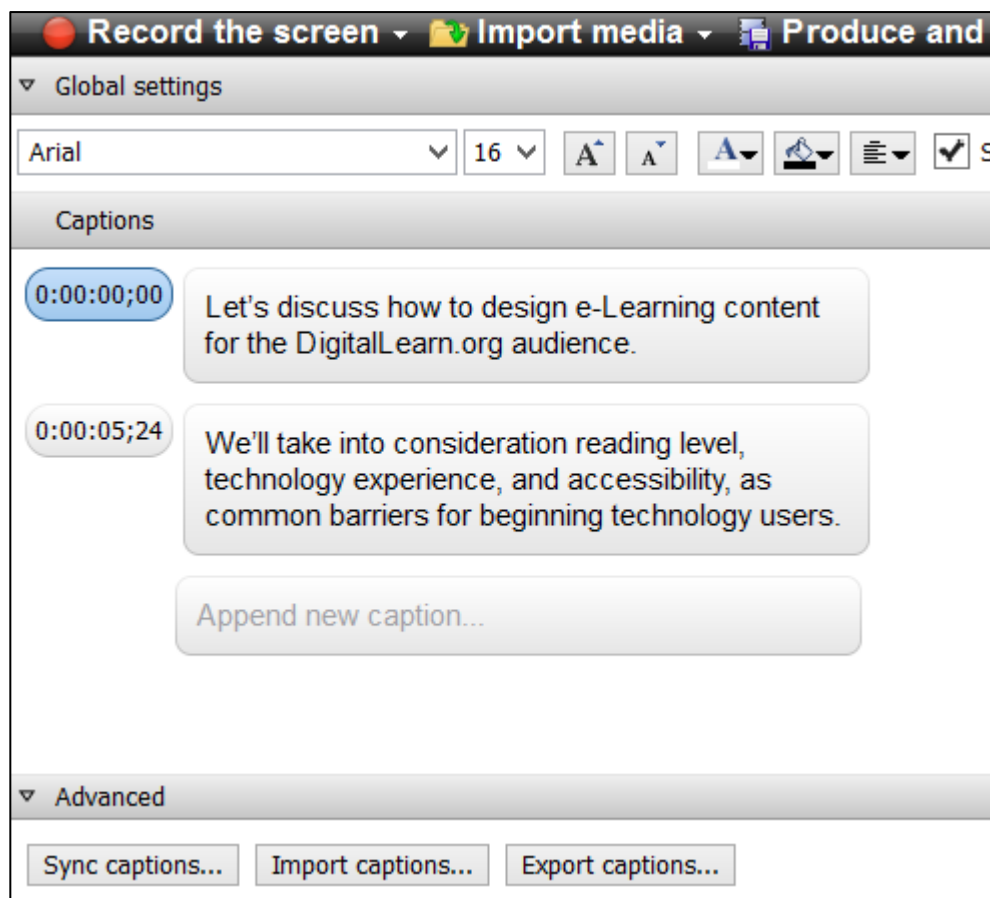


## Process for Adding Captions using Camtasia Studio (cont.)

- c. Paste in the script for the current slide. Remove any line breaks, extra spaces, or animation notes



- d. Click "Sync Captions." As the audio plays, click on the text at the points where the captions should split.



## Process for Adding Captions using Camtasia Studio (cont.)

- e. Click “Export Captions” and enter a file name (referencing the lesson and slide number) to save the caption file.
  - f. Delete the tracks in the bottom half of Camtasia to begin the process for the next slide. (You can delete the tracks by pressing CTRL+A then Delete.)
4. Add the captions in Articulate Storyline by repeating this process on each slide or layer with an audio track:
  - a. Click the audio icon in the slide to open the Audio Tools tab.
  - b. In the Accessibility Group, click the plus sign next to Captions.
  - c. Select the caption file generated in Camtasia.
5. Preview the course with the CC button turned on to ensure captions were added correctly.
